TO THE WORK!

W. Robertson Nicoll made the following observation: "The thing most to be dreaded is not poverty, but idleness; and the thing most to be desired is not wealth, but strenuous, earnest, and useful toil." Somehow, in today's world, we have forgotten this important truth and are the worse for it.

There is an even greater problem than our loss of work ethic. It is that we are working for the wrong things. Jesus said, "Do not work for the food which perishes, but for the food which endures to eternal life, which the Son of Man shall give to you..." (Jn. 6:27). There are many dangers associated with working for material riches. Solomon reminds us that the one "who trusts in his riches will fall..." (Prov. 11:28). Later, in the same book, he said: "Do not weary yourself to gain wealth..." (23:4). There is nothing wrong with working to get ahead in this life just so long as we do not ignore the next life. Paul told Timothy to "Instruct those who are rich in this present world not to be conceited or to fix their hope on the uncertainty of riches, but on God, who richly supplies us with all things to enjoy." Then, he added, "Instruct them to do good, to be rich in good works, to be generous and ready to share, storing up for themselves a good foundation for the future, so that they may take hold of that which is life indeed" (1 Tim. 6:17-19).

There are two words that seem to flow together in the pages of Scripture. They are the words "good" and "works." Jesus said, "Let your light shine before men in such a way that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father who is in heaven" (Mt. 5:16). Again, in Ephesians 2:10, we read: "For we are His workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand, that we should walk in them."

God calls His people to a life of good works. Every day is another opportunity to be engaged in good works. A life marked by good works is practical evidence that we understand and appreciate what Jesus did for us on the cross. He "gave Himself for us, that He might redeem us from every lawless deed and purify for Himself a people for His own possession, zealous for good deeds" (Titus 2:14). Each new day brings with it a wonderful opportunity for us to get involved in life's most important work, the good work of God. And, when this life is over, how blessed we will be to hear Jesus say, "Well done, good and faithful slave…" (Mt. 25:21). Until then, let us get to the work!

"Only A Day Away!" -Spencer Cromwell "Dear friends, now we are children of God, and what we will be has not yet been made known. But we know that when He appears, we shall be like Him, for we shall see Him as He is. Everyone who has this hope purifies himself, just as He is pure." 1 John 3:2-3



The catchy song from the beloved musical "Annie" captures the instinctive hope within the heart of most of humanity: "Tomorrow, tomorrow,

I love ya, tomorrow, you're only a day away." Today may be a bummer, rainy, dark, and dreary, but the sun will come out tomorrow, and things can only be better than today. The famous last lines of the classic movie, Gone with the Wind, elicits the hope of tomorrow which rings eternal in the human spirit; Scarlett O'Hara: "I'll go home. And I'll think of some way to get him back. After all...tomorrow is another day." It is as though such thinking offers a constant "free play" card in your pocket, or a "Get out of Jail Free" Monopoly card always hidden away; a card called "tomorrow."

The Bible has a different perspective of tomorrow than the natural hope that it will somehow bring something better. Proverbs 27:1 warns: "Do not boast about tomorrow, for you do not know what a day may bring forth." And James adds to it: "Now listen, you who say, 'Today or tomorrow we will go to this or that city, spend a year there, carry on business and make money.' Why, you do not even know what will happen tomorrow. What is your life? You are a mist that appears for a little while and then vanishes. Instead, you ought to say, 'If it is the Lord's will, we will live and do this or that.' As it is, you boast and brag. All such boasting is evil. Anyone, then, who knows the good he ought to do and doesn't do it sins" (James 4:13-14). Live for Christ today and give yourself a constant hope and joy found in each day knowing that tomorrow might be the Lord's return and eternity with Him in that great mansion-home in heaven with Him!
