STUMBLING BLOCKS

A *stumbling block* is anything which causes another person to stumble. The expression is used most often in the New Testament as a metaphor. In his letter to the Romans, the apostle Paul asked his readers "not to put an obstacle or a stumbling block in a brother's way" (Rom. 14:13). At the time, there were some Christians in Rome who, because of their background in pagan idolatry, could not eat certain types of food without violating their conscience. Paul took special care not to cause these to stumble.


We are all responsible for our own behavior and will be judged according to what we have done whether good or bad (2 Cor. 5:10). But, it is a serious matter and one for which we will be held accountable, if our behavior contributes to the downfall of another. On one occasion, Jesus set a child before His disciples and warned: "whoever causes one of these little ones who believe in Me to stumble, it is better for him that a heavy mill-stone be hung around his neck, and that he be drowned in the depth of the sea. Woe to the world because of its stumbling blocks! For it is inevitable that stumbling blocks come; but woe to that man through whom the stumbling block comes!" (Matt. 18:6-7).

Each of us have influence on someone. Our influence may be good or evil. But, we all have influence. The Lord expects His people to exert good influence. We are the "light of the world" and the "salt of the earth" (Matt. 5:13-16). Light must shine consistently in the home, at the school, and in the workplace as well as in the assembly.

Questions that begin with "What's wrong with..." often betray the hidden motive of justifying sinful attitudes or behaviors. Still, the question is raised: "How can we tell if our behavior might find occasion to become a stumbling block?" A few simple questions might help: (1) Does this activity draw me closer to the Lord or does it put greater distance between us? (2) Does this activity make it easier for me to tell others about Jesus or do I have to quietly tuck my faith away in order to participate? (3) Is this something I would feel no shame in doing if the Lord should come while I am doing it? And, finally, (4) Can I picture this as an activity the Lord would pursue? If any of these questions required a negative response, then a fresh look needs to be taken in regard to personal example and participation in the questioned activity. The will of the Lord and the salvation of souls ought to come before our own selfish pleasures if we desire to please Him.

Whether you are still in school or dealing with office politics, the opinion of others is as consistent as the wind. As I left my middle school in 8th grade, everything changed. It was as though I'd never been there. No more parties, no more being picked first, no more popularity. Funny how that works, huh? It feels so great in the moment – to be on top and have everyone know it – but it fades so fast.

Popularity always ends. That's what King Solomon is getting at when he describes the fickleness of men's opinions in Ecclesiastes 4:13-16. It's nice to be popular – to have everyone approve of what we do and to achieve much. But our worldly achievements and the approval of others have a shorter shelf life than cottage cheese. Solomon calls it "meaningless, a chasing after the wind" (Ecclesiastes 4:16).

When we're trying to win someone's approval, we put time, energy and effort into whatever they find most important. So let's make sure we're focusing on the only opinion that matters. To strive for popularity is meaningless. To strive for approval from others is meaningless. God's approval given to all of us through faith in Jesus is meaningful.
