KEYS TO A HAPPY MARRIAGE (2)

Marriage can be, and should be, among the most satisfying relationships known to man. Yet, such is often not the case. There are many reasons why marriage has fallen into a state of disarray. But the heart of the issue has to do with the fact that, to a large degree, we have departed from God's original design. Last week we mentioned the importance of placing marriage before all earthly relationships. One must leave his or her parents and establish a new identify as husband or wife. While parents are still important and loved, there must be a sense of independence—a new identity as husband and wife. Without leaving father and mother, future difficulties will surely arise. God said, "For this cause a man shall leave his father and his mother, and shall cleave to his wife; and they shall become one flesh" (Gen. 2:24). A man must leave his father and mother.

A second important principle for marital success is found in the phrase, "and shall cleave to his wife...." *Cleave* means to glue or cement together. It implies a firm and strong unity—the kind of unity found in lifetime commitment. When two "cleave to one another", they cannot be torn apart without damaging both partners. This, in part, explains why divorce is so devastating. After Jesus told married couples to cleave to one another, He added, "What therefore God has joined together, let no man separate" (Mt. 19:6).

What is involved in cleaving to one another? Anything which cements more firmly the relationship between a husband and wife is part of the cleaving process. It would include shared experiences, whether joyful or sorrowful. Things we do in marriage should be preceded by asking, "Will this activity draw us closer together or drive us further apart?" If something creates greater distance between husband and wife, it should be reconsidered.

Strong, enduring marriages are not a matter of luck, but hard work. Many have drifted from the belief that marriage is a lifetime commitment. Bishop Spong went so far as to suggest that "the high divorce rate represents something positive rather than negative for human life" (Living in Sin?). He goes on to suggest that divorce is the cost we must pay for the emancipation of women. In other words, the Bible does not have relevance in modern moral decisions. Is it any wonder why we have drifted from God's plan for marriage when religious leaders have rejected the Bible, saying it is not always relevant? Just when is it relevant? Only when we agree? Not so, if we claim to follow God's pattern at all, we must follow it completely.
