JESUS AND THE POOR

Securing a loan requires evidence of a person's ability to repay. Collateral, gainful employment, or some other guarantee of funds providing reasonable expectation of future repayment are needed before the monies can be made available. We can relate to the frustration of the man who, when asked about collateral for a loan, muttered, "If I had the money, I wouldn't be here asking for a loan!"

So far as we know, there were no banks in the first-century. Although they did not always follow God's law, the Jewish people were forbidden from charging exorbitant interest (usury) to their countrymen (Ex. 22:25; Lev. 25:36-37; Dt. 23:19-20 cf. Neh. 5:1-13). However, charging reasonable interest in the ordinary affairs of business seems to have been commonly practiced in the time of Christ (Mt. 25:27; Lk. 19:23). While there were no banks, there were people who loaned money. Imagine how Jesus might have fared has He sought a loan from one of these money-lenders!

Jesus openly confessed to a would-be follower that "The foxes have holes and the birds of the air have nests, but the Son of Man has nowhere to lay His head" (Mt. 8:20). From an earthly perspective, Jesus would have been a bad loan risk. He lived as an itinerant preacher, trusting in the Father to provide the "daily bread" necessary to sustain His physical life (cf. Mt. 6:11). This the religiously elite would have had trouble accepting in someone claiming to be the Messiah. But this is the life Jesus chose. Although "He was rich, yet for your sake He became poor, so that you through His poverty might become rich" (2 Cor. 8:9).

Jesus identified with the poor. In fact, His message of good news was uncompromisingly pointed in their direction. When asked to read in the synagogue of His hometown, Jesus turned to the prophecy of Isaiah which told about the coming Messiah who would "preach the gospel to the poor." Then, He closed the book, gave it back to the attendant, and said, "Today this Scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing" (Lk. 4:18-19 cf. Is. 61:1).

Among those most commonly discriminated against are the poor. God's indignation against such is evidenced throughout Scripture, especially in the inspired writings of the Old Testament prophets (e.g. Is. 10:1-2; Amos 8:4-6 cf. Prov. 14:31). Jesus' parables encourage kindness toward the poor (Lk. 14:13-24). He spoke of treasures in heaven (Mt. 6:19-21). He warned about the dangers of materialism (Lk. 12:15 cf. 1 Tim. 6:9-10, 17). Early disciples whole-heartedly accepted His teaching and generously responded to the needs of the less fortunate (Acts 6:1-6; Rm. 15:26). Nevertheless, some in the early church continued showing partiality to the rich while ignoring the needs of the poor (Jas. 2:1-4; 1 Jn. 3:17).

"Deep Sea Repentance"

The LORD appointed a great fish to swallow up Jonah. And Jonah was in the belly of the fish three days and three nights (Jonah 1:17, ESV).

The part that doesn't often get noticed in Jonah's well-known, underwater adventure is the connection between the moment when "the LORD spoke to the fish, and it vomited Jonah out upon the dry land" (Jonah 2:10) and the moment of Jonah's repentance. Jonah repented and was immediately delivered. Yet we know he was down there for three solid days leading up to his slimy rescue.

Listen: God will do anything to get our attention. He'll usually start gently before taking the more aggressive route. He'd rather we lived anywhere but in disobedience to Him!

Like Jonah, however, we can be slow to get the message. We can sometimes be put through the equivalent of a fish's belly, with all its suffocating . . and still not respond to God's attention-getting measures with repentance. But until we are lying down—in repentance—we are not yet in the right posture for things to change.
