"RIP IT OUT!"

In a devotional article, John Barry used Jesus' statement in Matthew 5:30 to emphasize our need to rip sin out of our lives. If you remember, Jesus said, "And if your right hand causes you to sin, cut it off and throw it away. For it is better that you lose one of your members than that your whole body go into hell."

In the physical realm, amputation is considered a drastic measure which sometimes must be taken in order to save a person's life. Spiritual amputation is the result of taking sin seriously and actively engaging in spiritual warfare against the forces of darkness that seek to defeat us.

To a large degree, we have grown tolerant of sin. We have cozied up to it, comfortably wrapping ourselves in the false assurance of our own broadmindedness and disposition of grace toward ourselves and others. But, overlooking sin does not accurately reflect the attitude of God (Acts 17:30-31). Judgment is coming at which time we must give an account (2 Cor. 5:10).

Sin, in all its forms, is a pernicious evil. Its wages is death (Rm. 6:23). Flirting with sin is like playing Russian roulette with a fully loaded pistol. To borrow the language of Moses in warning the children of Israel, "be sure your sin will find you out" (Num. 32:23). The deceitfulness of sin is seen in its ability to work in subtle, almost imperceptible ways to harden our hearts, desensitizing us to its grip of death (Hb. 3:13). Slowly, but surely, we lose consciousness and slip away into a spiritual stupor.

God's repeated call to sinful man is: "Wake up before it is too late!" While we are stirred by the goodness and kindness of God and drawn by His everlasting cords of love; these gracious attributes of God were never intended to be an excuse for sin or a substitute for repentance (Rm. 2:4; Jer. 31:3; Rm. 6:1-2). Instead, we are called to "come out...and be separate" (2 Cor. 6:17). We are told not to "participate in the unfruit-ful deeds of darkness, but instead even expose them" (Eph. 5:11). Rather than snuggling up to sin, we are told to "put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the flesh in regard to its lusts" (Rm. 13:14).

Let's face it--sin, in all its insidious forms, must be vigorously opposed. Nor is this a battle we can win by default. Satan "prowls around like a roaring lion, seeking someone to devour" (1 Pet. 5:8). We must resist him firm in our faith if we hope to overcome (1 Pet. 5:9; 1 Jn. 5:4). In such a battle as this, there can be no half-hearted response to sin in our lives. We must rip it out, cut it off, and throw it away.
