### **FAITH WALKS**

The life of a Christian is not guided by the present, but by what lies ahead-not by the temporal, but the eternal. "Faith walks simply, childlike, between the darkness of human life and the hope of what is to come" (Catherine De Hueck Doherty). The apostle Paul simply says, "We walk by faith, not by sight" (2 Cor. 5:7).

Faith is described for us in the eleventh chapter of Hebrews as "the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen" (vs. 1). The Christian's life is walked by faith—the assurance and conviction of things unseen.

Encouraging examples of faith are provided in God's word. These were men and women who were able to trust God even when human wisdom could find no other way. "Faith is the daring of the soul to go farther than it can see." Human wisdom cannot lead beyond the present world. Jeremiah prayed, "I know, O Lord, that a man's way is not in himself; nor is it in a man who walks to direct his steps" (Jer. 10:23).

This does not mean that human beings are unable to make spiritual decisions. It means that God must be the guiding force in all such decisions. Solomon warns that "There is a way which seems right to a man, but its end is the way of death" (Prov. 14:12). Remember Solomon's warning the next time you are tempted to listen to the advice of the world.

Faith in God is measured more by what we do than by what we say. It is never enough simply to profess faith-we must live it. Faith is acting on what we have heard from the Lord. "Faith comes from hearing, and hearing through the word of Christ" (Rm. 10:17). If we hope to grow in faith, we must study the word of God. Where our desire for God's word is diminished, we can expect small faith.

Hearing the word of God is but the first step. We must also act upon God's word. A living faith is one that springs into action. James says that "faith without works is dead" (Jas. 2:26). Genuine faith expresses itself in heartfelt obedience to the will of the Lord. Salvation requires an obedient faith. Paul describes such faith, saying, "For by grace you have been saved through faith. And this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God, not as the result of works, so that no one may boast" (Eph. 2:8-9). Clearly, we are saved by the grace of God. But that grace is conditioned upon a living, obedient faith. This is how faith walks in the direction of steadfast hope.
