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PERSPECTIVE

In order to live a meaningful life, we need to develop a sense of perspective. "It's all a matter of perspective" is a ready slogan for many who never want to be troubled by making tough moral decisions. While it is true that each brings to the discussion his or her own perspective; it is not true that varying perspectives agree with ultimate reality. God's word is the universal standard of truth by which all things are measured. Developing a godly perspective has to do with learning to recognize what matters most. Such perspective leads to an established set of biblical priorities.

We might illustrate perspective by making a list of all the things we would be willing to die for tomorrow. Creating such a list requires careful self-examination. Some will openly confess their willingness to die for the cause of Christ. Others will readily express their willingness to die for the sake of their friends and loved ones. But, very few of us would be willing to die tomorrow for our job or, for that matter, a hobby or recreational pursuit.

When we decide what we would be willing to die for tomorrow, we will gain perspective about the kind of things we should be living for today. The things we would be willing to die for ought to be the very same things we are presently giving our most steadfast devotion. This is based on perspective. However, our sense of perspective becomes clouded when we live for those things we are unwilling to die for and neglect the very things we list as things for which we are willing to give our lives.

Jesus says, "Seek first His kingdom and His righteousness; and all these things shall be added to you" (Mt. 6:33). Paul writes, "If then you have been raised up with Christ, keep seeking the things above, where Christ is, seated at the right hand of God" (Col. 3:1). That is perspective. We must not give ourselves over to the passing pleasures of the world, but look instead to things eternal. The "things that are seen are temporal [temporary] but the things which are not seen are eternal" (2 Cor. 4:18). A meaningful, happy life requires such perspective. --Glen Elliott--

"Let every person be quick to hear, slow to speak, slow to anger." James 1:19

As men and women our differences go beyond the obvious physical ones. We think differently, we respond differently, different things catch our hearts. Consider James' words. What a compelling picture of relationship! When we look at one another in the Church or in a relationship, we realize that this is just the person we need to help us become who God has made us to be, then our hearts are more likely to respond in attentive tenderness.
