A young captive in the land of Babylon, conventional wisdom would have said, "When in Babylon, do as the Babylonians ask." Why rock the boat? Because his purpose in life was to please God in every respect.

Let me challenge you to choose a purpose worth living for—a purpose that transcends this life. Make it your purpose to know the Lord, and love Him with all your heart. Purpose to be true to the teachings of our Lord and, when this life is over, purpose to be with Him forever in heaven.

"Watch Your Ego!" "When I felt secure, I said, 'I will never be shaken.' Lord, when you favored me, you made my royal mountain stand firm; but when you hid your face, I was dismayed. To you, LORD, I called; to the Lord I cried for mercy" (Psalms 30.6-8)

When things are going well and the winds are in our favor, we risk falling into a great illusion. I'm not referring to the idea that things will not change, that everything will always be in our favor, although some will be fooled thinking this way. I am talking about something more serious: that we think that way because we think we are all that. We think we know how to run things, because we are really good and deserving.

When we think we have control of the situation, we can lose track of God's mercy. We may become bold like Peter who decided to advise Jesus against going to Jerusalem and facing the cross. "Behind me, Satan! You don't understand the things of God" (Mt 16:23) was Jesus' response. When we become boastful we look at things our own way, without God's help. We become deluded, we are mistaken.

The Psalmist "fell into that trap" but God was good and "hid" His face from him. In other words, He left him alone for a while. That was enough. He admitted he was mistaken about himself and about life. The Lord then was merciful and life went back to normal. We must watch out for our ego. It promises what it is not able to deliver. We are fruit of God's mercy, and we will be wise in life when we do not stray from that. -Spencer Cromwell
